

# The KlezKamp Crostic

## Directions:

Welcome to the challenging (but not too challenging, I hope) world of crostic puzzles. Unlike crosswords, there are several ways to solve a crostic once you get going. Answer the clues; transfer the letters on the numbered dashes to the correspondingly numbered squares in the diagram. Work back and forth between the grid and the word list to complete the puzzle. The finished puzzle will spell out a quotation reading from left to right; black squares separate the words in the quotation. The “crostic” part of the puzzle (“crostic” derived from the Greek, meaning “head”) is that the first letters of the clued answers, reading down, will spell out the name of the author and the source of the quotation. Answer on page 34.
